

become sultan! Only, he does not know that the genie can grant every wish but he can't bring people back from the dead, kill someone or make anyone fall in love with anyone else.



Like the swan he didn't stay long. He was disturbed by a vehicle towing a rattling trailer load of motor bikes speeding along the road.




Brett and Jan Shelley tie the knot

Inquiry a chance to speak up on handling of parliamentarians' dual citizenship

Independent Member for Indi Cathy McGowan is encouraging people to make a submission to an inquiry examining how to ensure elected representatives are eligible to serve.

"I welcome the inquiry by the Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters into the operation of Section 44 of the Australian Constitution, which deals with citizenship," Ms McGowan said.

"Many people have contacted my office confused and annoyed by the current situation. Some have had good ideas about how to avoid it in future. This is an opportunity for the community to have a say directly."

Ms McGowan said it was important the matter was addressed thoroughly and resolved before another election.

"The inquiry is an important part of a process to ensure that all future members of the Australian Parliament comply with our constitution," she said.

The Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters inquiry will examine how laws could be improved to minimise the risk of candidates being found ineligible under Section 44, whether Parliament could legislate for procedures to renounce foreign citizenship, or whether the Constitution should be amended.

Submissions can be made until 9 February, and there will be a public hearing in December. Information on the inquiry and how to make a submission is here:



Dear Community Groups,

The Royal Flying Doctors Look over the Farm Fence Grants are now open for applications.

Grants of up to \$1500 are available for community groups to run events in their community to address mental health.

Examples include activities such as:

- Women's luncheon with a guest speaker: A luncheon for local women to attend with a guest speaker to present on managing stress and supporting family and community through tough times.
- Mindfulness workshop: A mindfulness workshop for teens to deal with mental health, as well as school and exam stress, facilitated by a local mental health worker.
- Local Art Competition: Have a local art competition with the theme "Look Over the Farm Gate". There could be several categories with one for school aged children, adults and artists, with prizes available for each category. At the opening night of the exhibition, there will be a local speaker who will talk about lived experience and the importance of accessing services.
