

Laurie and Louise landed in Shanghai for the celebration which was a surprise for their friend, who also travelled with his family to Shanghai. Staying on the banks of the Huangpu River at the Bund the weather proved to be outstanding during the trip.

A walk through the nearby Shanghai Yu Garden was delightful.

Next was a flight to Beijing. One of the best things we did was pre-arrange a driver and guide for our

visit to China. Few people speak English, and those who do generally have limited English, even in 'western style' hotels. Our guides were both outstanding.

We also visited the Forbidden City, the Heavenly Tower and Summer Palace. Amazing places which should not be missed.

Two of the highlights of the trip were the visit to the Great Wall near Beijing and the Terracotta Warriors near Xian.

The Great Wall at Mutianyu is one of the best preserved sections of the wall. The wall's total length is 21,196 kms.

Bullet train to Xian



The next part of our journey was towards Xian about 1200 kms south west of Beijing. The bullet train took us there in

about 5 hours. Very comfortable and surprisingly quiet.



It was far more pleasant than flying as we saw so much of the countryside. Every square metre is under cultivation.

The fascinating story of the Terracotta Warriors was explained to us by our guide. They were discovered by four farmers looking to sink a well for water in 1974. Buried in underground pits, the 8,000 terracotta soldiers and horses were part of the necropolis of China's first emperor, Qin Shihuangdi, to aid him in the afterlife.

The story goes that the warriors went undiscovered for 2000 years because everyone connected with the creation of them was killed so the secret would be safe. The only survivor was the son of the emperor Qin.

Once discovered the local farmers were afraid to remain after finding the white head of a warrior. Eventually they were given alternative land and the government began the painstaking task of restoring the site where thousands of pieces of terracotta were meticulously reassembled.

Bushfire Planning Workshop 10 am Saturday 6 January 2018


Merrijig Hall

Merrijig's newest road

Mansfield Shire Council has accepted one of the suggested names for the road which leaves off Buttercup Rd near Purcells Rd.

After advertising for community input and receiving quite a number of submissions the council's preferred name of Coombs Lane was lodged for approval with the Office of Geographic Names. Before approval an assessment is made to ensure that the suggested name complies with certain criteria. Three submissions were received suggesting Coombs Lane.

The road is located between 401 and 439 Buttercup Rd.

One of the submissions was the following:

".....the Coombs family purchased Merrijig Park in 1925 and farmed the land continuously until December 2006. Shortly after that on April 8, 2007 the death occurred of the last surviving member of the family, Marjorie Beryl Coombs.

She was born in Mansfield Hospital on December 10, 1924, the only daughter of Robert and Ethel Coombs. She had a brother, also Robert (Bobby), who pre-deceased her.

The land through which this lane goes was known as 'Purcells' and was purchased by the Coombs family in the 1960s. It was sold in 2006.

Marjorie was an identity in her own right being a champion horsewoman, known Australia- wide for her prowess. She won her first prize for riding at just under four years of age! She was a champion show jumper and hunter. In 1959 she and her treasured horse Pleasure, were chosen to represent Australia in New Zealand. In 1961 she again returned to New Zealand representing Australia in the Empire Games (now Commonwealth Games). She was Australia's top lady rider. In latter years she was a highly sought after judge of horses.

During the years Marj and her mother Ethel, farmed their property. Two women alone, displaying the tenacity and sense of purpose that coloured their lives.

At her death, Marj very generously bequeathed her estate, mainly to the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre. She also gave generously to the Mansfield Rotary, Lions and Apex Clubs and the Mansfield District Hospital.

We feel the naming of the road running through part of her family property is a fitting way to remember such an important person who affected so many people through her skills and generous nature."

Other suggestions were:

Young's Lane, Coombs Way, Dodemaide Drive, Wonnangatta/Mystery Rd, Crockett Rd.


The council has erected the sign opposite the entrance to the road.

January 16 - Quarry Application Council Determination Merrijiggers.

Families and friends, mark your diaries for Tuesday, January 16 at 5 pm at the Shire Council Chambers After almost two years of applications, objections, consultant advices, consultative meetings and the Shire's planning department work, the Merrijig Residents Action Group has been advised that the application to quarry at 401 Buttercup Road will be presented and voted on by our Councillors at the first meeting of the Council in 2018. So the date again, is the 16th.

Group spokesperson, Kym Lynch, said "We are hoping for a large objectors gallery in excess of 50 people, the more the better. "We are told this application is one of the most contentious ever presented to Council, so the bigger our objectors audience the more our message will be reinforced that we do not want a stone extraction business of any sort or under any conditions. Those against the application already number over 80 written objections and more than 600 petition signatures. "If you have not lodged a formal written objection, it is not too late - all objections have to be acknowledged up until the time of the meeting. Send an email to Lynn.Plummer@mansfield.vic.gov.au raising your concerns and issues.

The more support we have, the stronger our "no" case. Kym continued: If you can't be there on the night, we will be presenting an apology list to the Councillors, again reinforcing the will of the people is to receive a "no vote" from the Council.

Please email merrijiginfo@gmail.com or text Louise Jacob on mobile 0419 346 249 if you would like your name to be added to the apology list. Backgrounding update: The Councillors have visited the proposed site with the applicant, The Merrijig Residents Action Group have presented the "against" case at consultative meetings and have also privately met with the planners and the Councillors. We will have a final opportunity to reconfirm our strongest objection on the 16th.

For those interested to know the process, anybody who has submitted a written objection will receive advice of the meeting and can request the opportunity to talk briefly at the Council meeting before the Councillors vote on the matter. The meeting will be chaired by Mayor Volkering. The Council paperwork regarding the Shire position will be available (we believe on line) from Thursday 11th January. As at the last consultative meeting, the Merrijig Residents Action Group are planning to put forward a united position on behalf of the residents, holidaymakers, small business operators, indeed everybody who contests this application. The Merrijig Residents Action Group will hold a meeting for all those interested in the final updates from the Shire on the weekend of 13/14th to consider our position relative to the recommended Shire planning department determination.

Imagine being without power for 3 days like the King Valley after the recent storms? No lights, refrigeration,




Here are a few tips that can make getting through an extended blackout easier:

- * Keep some emergency cash tucked away ATMs may not work therefore no shopping with cards
 - * Keep your vehicle topped up with fuel during the summer months bowsers won't work without power
 - * Have a 72 hour supply of water stored if you rely on electricity to pump water to your house
 - * Do not open your freezer during a black out it will be fine for a couple of days. Cover with an insulated blanket. Put milk and other essentials into an eski with ice to avoid opening the fridge
- * Purchase a portable phone power pack to keep your phone charged up. Solar camp lanterns and gas camp stove can be useful too. The most important thing during a power outage is to stay safe

Just on a point of historic curiosity ~ it was due to the Prince attending Timbertop that Merrijig was connected to the electricity grid. Prior to this each property had their own large diesel generator and battery storage for power. Hot water heated by fuel stoves and some homes has gas lighting. Initially the plan was to bypass Merrijig and only connect Timbertop for the Princes' convenience. Naturally Merrijig residents stood together in protest until it was agreed that the power would come to all properties enroot to Timbertop.


