You may have seen advice about writing your phone number on the horse's hoof.

This is the WRONG message to horse owners - this is NOT helpful to owners or to emergency services and the reason is that if a horse is spooked and covered in ash or has damaged hooves, you will not see the number.

What is recommend is you use LIVESTOCK PEN to write your number on the horse's



BELLY. You would see this from a greater distance and it's much safer.

Also... have you registered your animals with the National Equine Database (NED)? It is so important to register and pre plan (including relocation) BEFORE an emergency occurs.

Adele McCormack, of McCormacks Rd was nominated for Senior citizen of the year also for her work on this Newsletter. 
Merrijig Rodeo was nominated as Event of the year for providing the event and supporting the community for 40 years with the acceptance speech given by President Beau Purcell enlightening the public on just how much money is put back into the community by the event. Secretary Robyn Baddeley said "The Committee was really honoured to have been nominated for Community Event of the Year." And continued saying "a lot goes into organising the Merrijig Rodeo and it is refreshing that our work has been recognised and that the 2017 Rodeo was seen as "The Best Rodeo to date". "

"We certainly hope that we can continue to make the Merrijig Rodeo bigger and better each year" she said, "and that we can increase our income which, in turn, means we can distribute more money to our much valued beneficiaries who work so hard for us."

Another nomination in the event of the year category was the Merrijig Family Fun Day where President Paul Jackson shared that "We a small group of people who put on this event and welcomed anyone present to come on board to keep the event running." The busy lives people have these days limits time available to spend organizing events like this Fun day," he said when interviewed, "We did think we would have to discard the pedestrian side of the day at one stage and go with the Gymkhana only, but fortunately some keen people have come forward, although busy – they think the event is important enough to keep it going as it has done the last 3 years."

I was contacted by Samantha Standish (nee_Deutcher) a week ago sitting beside Chris her dad as he had a wish to return to the Mt Buller Fire tower for one last visit - having been our eyes up there for 37 years." Gus went on to say "With one phone call I was able to organise a helicopter. And with the help of Spook, up on Buller and many others we made it happen" Gus concluded saying "It's still very emotional for me it was......special"

Samantha Standish, who is Chris's daughter, remarked that "the generosity of Mt Buller friends astounds me!" She personally thanked Gus Syme and Andy Kelly (Spook) who made it happen, "you are amazing and have created memories that will last a lifetime!" "I also would like to acknowledge and thank David Wells of DSE and Stewart Kreltzheim of the CFA who spoke very highly of my dad and helped to orchestrate things" Sam added.

Sam enlightens readers with the explanation of Chris's condition which has brought his life to this stage. "Dads condition is called Cortico Basel degeneration and is a rare neurological disease which results in loss of muscle tone and movement." Chris now resides in Buckland house where he is cared for magnificently and friends are encouraged to visit whenever they have the time.

On Facebook Jacquie Pollard remarked, "What a great group of people who arranged for Chris Deutscher to be taken back up to the fire tower where he spent so much of his life trying to keep the district safe by being the fire spotter." "What a Fantastic result.

Dave Lovick also commented saying "I have fond memories of Chris in the fire tower while I worked for the DSE. Chris would do his morning checks and say morning all on the radio. Sam, who did a lot of her growing up hanging out with her dad in the fire watch tower, said "it was a very emotional day but also very gratifying for Dad as the Buller tower was his passion and the place he felt truly at home."

"The generosity of the CFA, DSE and Buller crew was incredibly heart-warming and dad handled the trip superbly." Samantha added "The current fire tower man (*another Chris*) said really precious words to dad about what an honour it was to fill his shoes and that he has kept everything pretty much the same at the tower as a sign of respect to dad!"

2017's Northern Zone Grade 4 Dressage Champion has strong links with Merrijig.

Judy Kirkham recently left her Changue Rd home of several decades to live in Mansfield but remains a true Merrijigger – she sent in a story about how well her little granddaughter is doing and I asked her mother for more details as the story is an interesting one and shows what dedication can do.

Katie's (nee Kirkham) daughter, ten year old Charli Hill continues to excel with her love of horses. (That is Judy's granddaughter Charli.) Katie is the second daughter of Judy and David Kirkham.

Young Charli began her love of riding as a tiny tot around about 3 years of age and this passion has never waned. Katie explained that "The presentation night that mum sent you info on was called the NEDSS Presentations (NEDSS in an acronym for North Eastern Zone Series) which was a series consisting of 8 show jumping and 7 dressage events throughout the North East of Victoria."

She further explained, "There were events held at Wodonga, Benalla, Shepparton, Numurkah, Euroa, Seymour, Wangaratta and Moyhu over a 3-4 month period. Due to other riding commitments and Charli contracting pneumonia, we did not attend them all." "Still Charli was undefeated in winning champion in all of the

dressage events she attended in grade 4. She also came 4th overall in the show jumping in E grade (75cm)." said her proud mum.

"This was all run by the Pony Clubs within our zone and on her 13 hh New Forrest pony called MP Spiderman (aka Spider)."Katie said. "She also competed in the open section on her other pony who is a 13.3hh in grade 3 dressage and in D grade show jumping (85cm) and finished upgrading to C grade (1m) on this pony at the end of the year but as an open competitor you are not eligible to participate in the actual NEDS Series." Katie explained

"We are away almost every weekend competing in either dressage, show jumping or eventing as they all run in different seasons. We generally head away on a Friday and come home on the Sunday as most of them are two day events." She went on to explain. "Charli's dad Rodney does not come away with us as we have a farm and also livestock trucks so he is normally working or on the farm this makes it a real mother daughter affair." Katie happily remarked.



Charli works very hard and rides every day, most days she will ride the two horses, so she literally gets home, runs inside changes her clothes and jumps on her ponies. She has only Mondays off as she is also an avid swimmer and is also in a swim club in Seymour.

"She is very lucky and has three amazing sponsors that ensure we travel in comfort and that her horses and Charli always look flash and I don't know why really," Katie said, "other than to say that maybe people see how dedicated and hardworking she is and I suppose her horses stand out as the presentation of her horses, and Charli herself, is something that we work very hard at no matter where we are." For example Katie said, "Our horses, vehicles floats etc never leave our place dirty or looking unloved and people notice that, right or wrong but it does make a difference. I always remember my Nan telling me that the first impression is the most lasting impression!"

Katie mentioned her sponsors in saying."That seems to be working in Charli's favour with her sponsors who are Carpiole Equetrian Custom Made who make all her rugs, boots, hay bags etc, Kelcey Equestrian who ensure we travel in comfort with our lovely home away from home and makes sure she looks swish helping us with ensuring our horses are presented nicely at the larger State competitions and Heather Bain Dental Practice who do her ponies teeth for her."

"She trains with David Quick from Isle Of Wight Farm at his place in Murchison and he has been her coach since she started riding, he has competed at the top level of the sport in all the disciplines and is one of the country's top level coaches so we are very lucky to have had him as our coach for so long. He was also my coach back what seems like moons and moons ago!" Katie added.

The dedication of both mother and daughter, all those early morning starts, sometimes in the dark, and time spent preparing both horse and rider is obviously paying off..... Result young Charli won the recent Northern Zone Grade 4 Dressage champion award.

She has qualified two ponies for the interschool State Championships which will be help at Werribee in April and her aim is to try and get onto the National Team in show jumping and dressage and her aim in dressage is to qualify for the interzone state championships in eventing.

"Claire was a beautiful bride, it was a really lovely wedding and a good time was had by all." Said proud mum Sue.




Thursday Jan 24th showed just how easily fire can strike

"Lucky it's over now and we are lucky it did not hit us" said Ailish. Her sister Erin said "It was a bit scary and I am glad they got it out in time."

MERRIJIG RESIDENTS APPLAUD COUNCILLORS ON QUARRY DECISION

After almost two years of objection, Merrijig residents, their families and friends could sleep a little easier after the decision at the ordinary Mansfield Shire Council meeting on Monday, January 16 was voted 3/1 in rejection of a stone extraction application at 401 Buttercup Road.

A delegation of seven residents presented the "No" case to all five councillors again. They were speaking against a recommendation from the council's planning officers to approve the application.

Councillor Sladdin's motion to adopt the recommendation had lapsed for want of a seconder. Things changed for the better after Councillor Marg. Attley, the ward councillor for Tolmie, which covers Merrijig, moved for a notice of refusal to be issued. This was seconded by Cr Peter Olver.

http://www.mansfield.vic.gov.au/Libraries/2017_Council_Meeting_Minutes/Council_Minutes - 16_January_2018.sflb.ashx The matter starts on page 21 with the motion to adopt the officer recommendation being on Page 49 and the one to refuse being dealt with on page 51.

Applause resonated around the Council chambers from the 40 residents in the gallery. The motion was well supported by Cr Harry Westendorp and Mayor, Cr Paul Volkering, all of who received rounds of applause after they spoke of the importance of preserving country, community, peace, tranquillity, rural amenity, viable tourism businesses and other businesses that enjoy the flow on effects from visitors and residents coming to Mansfield and its environs. "We are very happy and more than a little relieved by this overwhelming show of support from our councillors. They are elected by us for them to represent our views, but they do have to balance the benefits of new businesses wanting to come to Mansfield. This stone extraction proposition is clearly a business wanting to operate in the wrong location", said Kym Lynch, a spokesperson for the Merrijig Residents Action Group.

"Our key issue was the Significant Landscape Overlay, a technical planning term which provides a proactive envelope for what can and cannot happen in our area. It is there to protect and enhance the area in which we all live, the fabulous views and the countryside we enjoy and work in and with. Much of the Mansfield Shire is protected by this SLO which recognises the unique landscape we have here. It is not just about Mount Buller and its approaches. "This stone extraction business was wanting to be granted a permit to operate for 10 years, 7am to 4.30pm, five days a week and dig thousands of tonnes of rock. The application did not include an actual surveyed site location, a Revegetation Plan nor a Management Plan. It did not have accurate or appropriate road safety data nor acoustic testing," Kym concluded.

Ms Angela Killingsworth, who focussed on compliance issues in the group's presentation said: "The Shire's acting Governance and Development Services Manager, Ms Dawn Bray, had recommended its approval with 49 conditions, 72% of which would have required monitoring by the Shire or the residents playing watchdog. We think this is an impossible and unfair ask and if this many imposts are needed to ensure the operation is OK, then surely this alone determines it is in the wrong place. Our councillors agreed", Angela said.

In summary Kym continued "Over the two years we have remained strongly opposed to this business. We have never waivered or wilted in our endeavour to stop it. As of Monday night we had 80 written objections with council, a petition of 616 signatories and we had 40 in the gallery plus 23 apologies.

"This stone extraction in this location would damage Merrijig's tourism businesses and create more issues with road safety, noise attenuating around the Delatite Valley and vibrations in houses and don't forget the dust which is terrible in the dry times. This application brought a huge conflict of land use between existing rural residential landholders and tourism businesses and stone extraction compatibility.

"Our councillors recognised this. But of even more importance, they recognised that this business would not bring one job, not any money, nor even any stone to Mansfield, as the stone is being sold into Melbourne. Such a negative net income is not sustainable for the Shire.



"However we recognise there is one more possible hurdle to jump, that being a possible VCAT appeal by the applicant. If that happens, and we will know in 28 days, the Merrijig Residents Action Group will be ready to stand by the Council and assist in any way we can. We are hoping it won't come to this," she concluded.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Application summary

The owner/applicant of 401 Buttercup Road applied to Council for a retrospective planning permit to allow operations for a 5 day a week, 10 year rock extraction licence, with operations allowed from 7am to 4.30pm across multiple sites on his 400 acre property. The owner had been excavating rock without a permit on the escarpment of his property and trucking it into Melbourne for sale.

Local residents who heard, felt and saw the activities in and around their homes in March 2016 and contacted Mansfield Council which put a stop to this operation.

In a further development, the site of the stone extraction location at 401 Buttercup Road has been sold and is no longer owned by the applicant.

Mansfield Tourism Facts and Figures

Tourism is the key industry in Mansfield with approximately 1.2 million visitor stays to the Shire every year. Tourism employs 28% of the workforce in the municipality and contributes an estimated \$135 million per year or just over 60% of the Shire's annual gross tourism earnings".

Merrijig and the surrounding area are very much part of this tourist endeavour. There are four accommodation providers as immediate neighbours to the proposed quarry site.

At Merrijig Township approximately 4 kms down the road from the proposed quarry, there are more tourist accommodation establishments and the famous Hunt Club Hotel. Just a few more kilometres up the hill there is more accommodation for visitors and restaurants.

There are also horse riding businesses based in Merrijig and many of their trail rides start in Merrijig and frequently use Buttercup Road as they make their way into the National Park.

THE CALICO COUNTRY by Christine Sheldrick. January 2018

Christine says "I would love to help people again and being new in the area it could be easier for local people to talk with me. Of course confidentiality is part of any conversation. Skype, email, or face to face is fine for me."

"Because I have been training, teaching and counselling in various situations and institutions since I began as a volunteer at the Manly Drug Referral Centre my experience covers many and varied situations." Christine shared, "I began my journey along this road because I wanted to learn about addiction and drugs as I had young children and we were living in Sydney."

Although the telephone service can be dicey in Alpine Ridge at times you can contact Christine via mobile 0412 825 324 any messages left will be responded to as they are received when signal is strong enough.

In this district It can be difficult to get in to see a good counsellor when you need one, so the assistance Christine can give to people in need will be a bonus to the whole community.




